THE CHURCH OF ST. PETER THE APOSTLE

WALTON ON THE HILL. SURREY

HISTORY: The first church, on the site of St. Peter's, was a stone building (c.13th century) founded by John de Walton (see tomb on exterior north wall). The nave and tower were rebuilt in 1817, with the existing tower constructed in 1895. The Lady Chapel was added, on the north side of the church, in 1870. A sedilia and ogee-headed piscina can be found in the chancel (18th century). The list of the Lords of the Manor and Rectors, which can be seen at the West end of the Church, dates back to Norman times. The value of the living in the reign of Henry VIII was £12.6s.3½d and included a house and 30 acres of glebe!

TREASURES: Our greatest treasure is undoubtedly the lead font which dates back to the latter part of the 12th century. It is said to have been brought from the chapel at Walton Manor, after the Reformation and is one of only 29 lead fonts in the country. The communion plate includes a cup dated 1568. A fine copy of 'The Madonna' by Murillo (The Prado Museum, Madrid) hangs over the altar in The Lady Chapel. The altar was given by Mr. H. E. Crawley, in memory of his mother and brothers and consecrated in 1927.

WINDOWS: The east window of the chancel is richly coloured and has four traceried lights, with a transom. One of the south east windows of the nave contains fragments of late 15th century glass, including a seated figure of St Augustine, in white and gold. Another, is a fine 'Arts and Crafts Movement', two-light window, by Christopher Whall, in beautiful stained glass. The Millennium window, our modern treasure, can be found on the north wall of The Lady Chapel. Designed by Jonathan Leckie, it shows four well known views of our lovely village. This was given by the residents and friends of Walton on the Hill, as part of our heritage for future generations.

CHURCHYARD: Entrance to the churchyard is through a pleasing lych-gate, erected in memory of the Reverend Henry Joseph Greenhill, Rector from 1878 - 1906. There are many interesting memorials and tombs in the cemetery and a feeling of calm and serenity prevails. This is especially true of the garden of rest at the rear of the church. Our Churchyard cross is a fitting memorial to those who fell in the two World Wars and the Iraq war.

BELLS: The Commissioners of Edward VI recorded in 1549: "iii bells in the steple". Two of them have inscriptions, the Treble: "William Eldridge made mee 1681" and the Tenor: Robertus:mot:me:fecit 1591".
